The Reading of the Word—Luke 22:24-38

24 A dispute also arose among them, as to which of them was to be regarded as the greatest. 25 And he said to them, "The kings of the Gentiles exercise lordship over them, and those in authority over them are called benefactors. 26 But not so with you. Rather, let the greatest among you become as the youngest, and the leader as one who serves. 27 For who is the greater,

one who reclines at table or one who serves? Is it not the one who reclines at table? But I am among you as the one who serves.

28 "You are those who have stayed with me in my trials, 29 and I assign to you, as my Father assigned to me, a kingdom, 30 that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom and sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel.

31 "Simon, Simon, behold, Satan demanded to have you, that he might sift you like wheat, 32 but I have prayed for you that your faith may not fail. And when you have turned again, strengthen your brothers." 33 Peter said to him, "Lord, I am ready to go with you both to prison and to death." 34 Jesus said, "I tell you, Peter, the rooster will not crow this day, until you deny three times that you know me."

35 And he said to them, "When I sent you out with no moneybag or knapsack or sandals, did you lack anything?" They said, "Nothing." 36 He said to them, "But now let the one who has a moneybag take it, and likewise a knapsack. And let the one who has no sword sell his cloak and buy one. 37 For I tell you that this Scripture must be fulfilled in me: 'And he was numbered with the transgressors.' For what is written about me has its fulfillment." 38 And they said, "Look, Lord, here are two swords." And he said to them, "It is enough."

The People of God respond to His Word by confessing their sins, repenting of their sinful ways, and seeking God's favor through the reconciling work of Jesus, the Son of God.

Corporate Confession of Sin—based on Isaiah 1:2-6, 10-17

Pastor: Lord, we come confessing. You have brought us up like children, but we have rebelled against You.

All: We are burdened with iniquity, we are evildoers who deal corruptly. We have forsaken and despised You, O Lord.

Pastor: We continue to rebel—we are sick and our heart is faint.

All: From the sole of our feet to the top of our head, there is no soundness in our bodies.

Pastor: Hear the word of the Lord, and give ear to the teaching of our God. We have put our trust in our service and obedience.

We have trampled His house with vain offerings and offensive prayers.

All: We have burdened You, O Lord, with our fleshly obedience.

Pastor: You call us to wash ourselves and to make ourselves clean; to remove the evil of our deeds from before your eyes.

All: May we cease to do evil and learn to do good; to seek justice and correct oppression; to bring justice to the fatherless and plead the widow's cause.


Guidelines for the Lord's Supper


At Cornerstone, we come forward to receive communion. You may take the bread at the first table and then proceed to either side for the wine/grape juice.

Prayer for Those Searching for Truth. Lord Jesus, you claim to be the way, the truth, and the life. Give me an understanding of you that is coherent, convincing, and that leads to the life you promise. Amen.

I thank you for paying my debt on the cross, taking what I deserved in order to offer me complete forgiveness. Prayer of Commitment. Lord Jesus, you have called us to follow you in baptism and in a life of committed discipleship through membership in your church. Grant that I may take the necessary steps to be one with your people, and live in the fullness of your Spirit. Amen.





LITURGICAL CALENDAR AND EPIPHANY

God built within His people an innate desire to celebrate, to mark seasons and events, to set up "stones of remembrance" so that we do not forget His goodness and promises. One method that the Church has used over time is dividing each year according to the events in the life of Christ—a reminder of redemptive history. Although the Church Calendar is not prescribed by Scripture, it can be a useful framework or tool to help walk our hearts through the Gospel every year.

The major divisions of the liturgical year are:

- Advent—The four Sundays leading to Christmas; preparation for the coming of Christ and the need for a Savior
- Christmas and the Twelve Days—Celebration of the Incarnation and the Gift of Christ, our Redeemer
- Epiphany—January 6; Coming of the Magi for Christ is the Light of the World; Hope for the Gentiles; Kingship of Christ
- Lent—from Ash Wednesday to Easter; repentance and reflection; recognition that our sinfulness leads to the cross; intentional time to exercise the disciplines of grace
- Holy Week—Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday; Jesus as King, Priest, Prophet; The remembrance that the shedding of blood was necessary for the forgiveness of sins
- Easter—Resurrection of the Living Lord; the conquering of death and sin
- Ascension—Christ in Power at the right hand of the Father; Christ interceding as the Mediator
- Pentecost—Coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church; God sends out His people as the Church
- Ordinary Time—The weeks between Pentecost and Advent; Living in light of the Gospel as the Church

In Luke 22:24-38, a dispute breaks out among the disciples about who is the greatest and Jesus foretells Peter's denial, all the while the march to the cross grows closer. The questions below are designed to help you further understand and apply the teaching from today's message. Please take time to read and reflect on the questions with your family, home fellowship group, or a friend.

- There are a number of ironic juxtapositions in this text. How many can you identify? What do these ironic juxtapositions teach us?
- What disputes are rising up in your life because you're focused on your own greatness? How would a deeper embrace of Christ's greatness shift your focus away from yourself and toward serving others?
- Peter's self assurance is a weakness (see Proverbs 16:18). Why was it good that he was sifted like wheat? Can you recall a time when you were being sifted like wheat? What good design did God have in that hard trial for you?
- ➤ What comfort should we receive from Jesus' prayers for us in the midst of trial and failure (Hebrews 7:25)?
- ➤ Jesus says it must be fulfilled that he would be "numbered among the transgressors" (Isaiah 53:I2). How is this fulfilled in the cross? Why is it good news for you and me that Christ was numbered among the transgressors?
