SERVICE OF CELEBRATION AND GOSPEL RENEWAL

Fourth Sunday of Easter 21 April 2013

The parable of the Good Samaritan from Luke IO again provides the core of our service—who is our neighbor and what does it mean to love and serve them. Psalm III reminds us in our Call to Worship that the Lord is gracious and merciful and He provides food for those who fear Him. We continue by singing Crown Him With Many Crowns for He is the Lord of love as well as O the Deep, Deep, Love of Jesus.

In the New Testament Reading from Galatians 5, Paul reminds us that loving our neighbor is one way we serve one another in freedom. The Prayer of Confession from I Peter 4 reflects our failure to do that by not loving others as He has loved us. We prayerfully respond by singing Jesus, I My Cross Have Taken for He has called us to leave everything and follow Him—He owns our love even as He calls us to serve those around us.

Our Communion Hymns—O Lord, How Joyful Tis to See and I Will Go both speak of our loves for others in dwelling together in unity as well as being a servant called to let go of anything that captures our attention other than the glory of Christ. Our final hymn, Awake My Zeal, Awake My Love, calls us to respond to the love of God by serving Him in the ways that we care for our neighbors and those in need. By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for the brothers.—I John 3:16


GOD CALLS HIS PEOPLE TO WORSHIP



The Reading of the Word—Luke 10:25-37

25 And behold, a lawyer stood up to put him to the test, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" 26 He said to him, "What is written in the Law? How do you read it?" 27 And he answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." 28 And he said to him, "You have answered correctly; do this, and you will live."

29 But he, desiring to justify himself, said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" 30 Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and he fell among robbers, who stripped him and beat him and departed, leaving him half dead. 31 Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. 32 So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33 But a Samaritan, as he journeyed, came to where he was, and when he saw him, he had compassion. 34 He went to him and bound up his wounds, pouring on oil

and wine. Then he set him on his own animal and brought him to an inn and took care of him. 35 And the next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper, saying, 'Take care of him, and whatever more you spend, I will repay you when I come back.' 36 Which of these three, do you think, proved to be a neighbor to the man who fell among the robbers?" 37 He said, "The one who showed him mercy." And Jesus said to him, "You go, and do likewise."






For Thine is the Kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.







We are returning to the story of the Good Samaritan today to discuss more practically what it would mean to live by the teaching of this passage. Please take the questions below personally and consider with your family and HFG what committing to love our neighbor as ourselves.

What is your biggest barrier in getting to know and serving your neighbors?

One of the leading characteristics of good neighboring is compassion. Do you have compassion on others? If not, how might the gospel train your heart in compassion for your neighbors?

As love for neighbors becomes characteristic of your life, you begin to create margin in your life for helping others. Two things that change: pace and flexibility.

- Can you be interrupted without causing great frustration?
- Are you flexible enough to adapt to changing circumstances?
- Do you live at a pace that makes helping others virtually impossible?
- Depending on your answers to the questions above, consider ways that you might need to adapt your life
 or create accountability in your life that you might be freed up to serve your neighbors better.

What small steps can you (or your family) make this next week for getting to know your most immediate neighbors at home, work, school, etc.? Whatever it is, make a plan to do so and be prayerful as you go. If God changes your plans by drawing your attention to obvious needs of other neighbors, then great, do that! As always, watch for His lead!
