SERVICE OF CELEBRATION AND GOSPEL RENEWAL

Seventh Sunday of Easter & Ascension Sunday 12 May 2013 Today we celebrate the Ascension of Christ to His place of glory and power and the right hand of the Father. In many ways, the Ascension and Pentecost (next Sunday) are the completion of the work of the cross and redemption and the Season of Easter. The death of death and the conquering of sin is sealed in the resurrection and finished in the position of authority that Christ has. In addition, we begin a several week series on The Lord's Prayer from Luke II focusing on our Father and His hallowed name.

We begin with singing Verse 7 from Crown Him with Many Crowns who is enthroned in worlds above. The Call to Worship from Psalm II5 for to His name alone belongs glory. We continue by singing All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name and our hymn for May, Worship the Lord in the Beauty of Holiness.

The New Testament Reading from Colossians I reminds us of the glory of the ascended Christ by whom all things were created and hold together and He is the head of the Church. The Prayer of Confession confronts our hearts desire to supplant the rule of Christ by looking to our own interests and acting as if we were equal with God.

Our next hymn, Psalm 5: Hear My Words, focuses on the practice of prayer and the desire for the Lord to hear us and bring us into worship. The Profession from God's Word from Psalm 121 reassures us that God, our Father, is our keeper. The Hymns of Communion include Our Father and Sing to Jesus—that talks of the ascension as an example of the exaltation of Christ.

The final hymn, O Christ, Our Hope, sings of the work of Christ in the death and resurrection as well as the ascension.


GOD CALLS HIS PEOPLE TO WORSHIP

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Corporate Confession of Sin—based on Philippians 2:I-I0

Pastor: Lord, we come confessing. Although there is great encouragement in Christ, comfort in love, participation in the Spirit, and affection and sympathy, we are not of the same mind,

All: Neither do we share the same love or act in one accord.

Pastor: We act in pride—desiring the best for ourselves and wanting others to fail.

All: We do not act in humility nor consider others more significant than ourselves.

Pastor: We look to our own interests and ignore the interests of others.

All: We do not have the mind of Christ Jesus—because we act as if we were equal with God.

Pastor: We resist acting as a servant, humbling ourselves, and obeying—

All: Especially to the point of self-sacrifice or death.

Pastor: But Christ did obey and humble Himself on our behalf, therefore,

God has highly exalted Him and given Him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus our knees will bow along with all in heaven and on earth and under the earth,

All: And our tongues will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.




Silent Prayers of Confession

Behold, he who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.


The LORD is your keeper; the LORD is your shade on your right hand.


THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

Prayer of Thanksgiving and Intercession





- Take time now to pray through the first petition of the Lord's Prayer now and ask your Father for the growth in prayer you desire (Matthew 7:11).
