
Guidelines for the Lord's Supper

We hope that this time is helpful to you as you consider your relationship with Jesus Christ and with His people, the church.

At Cornerstone, we come forward to receive communion. You may take the bread at the first table and then proceed to either side for the wine/grape juice.

Today we celebrate the birthday of the church in the coming of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. We see a beautiful continuity of the presence of the Spirit by fire that echoes the smoking pot in Genesis 15, the burning bush, the pillar of fire that led the people of Israel and that settled down on the tabernacle and the mercy seat of the Ark of the Covenant, and the fire that consumed the sacrifices on Mt Carmel with Elijah. The symbol and presence is the same as in the Old Testament, but with the New Covenant comes the writing of the law on our hearts instead of residing in the Ark—thus the fire of the Spirit rests on the heads of those on the day of Pentecost just as it did over the Ark. In addition, Paul teaches that the people of God are collectively the Temple of the Holy Spirit even as His presence filled the Tabernacle and Temple. Pentecost is a vibrant picture of the coming of the Kingdom.

LITURGICAL CALENDAR

God built within His people an innate desire to celebrate, to mark seasons and events, to set up "stones of remembrance" so that we do not forget His goodness and promises. One method that the Church has used over time is dividing each year according to the events in the life of Christ—a reminder of redemptive history. Although the Church Calendar is not prescribed by Scripture, it can be a useful framework or tool to help walk our hearts through the Gospel every year.

The major divisions of the liturgical year are:

- Advent—The four Sundays leading to Christmas; preparation for the coming of Christ and the need for a Savior
- Christmas and the Twelve Days—Celebration of the Incarnation and the Gift of Christ, our Redeemer
- Epiphany—January 6; Coming of the Magi for Christ is the Light of the World; Hope for the Gentiles; Kingship of Christ
- Lent—from Ash Wednesday to Easter; repentance and reflection; recognition that our sinfulness leads to the cross; intentional time to exercise the disciplines of grace
- Holy Week—Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday; Jesus as King, Priest, Prophet; The remembrance that the shedding of blood was necessary for the forgiveness of sins
- Easter—Resurrection of the Living Lord; the conquering of death and sin
- Ascension—Christ in Power at the right hand of the Father; Christ interceding as the Mediator
- Pentecost—Coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church; God sends out His people as
 the Church
- Ordinary Time—The weeks between Pentecost and Advent; Living in light of the Gospel as the Church

Today is Pentecost Sunday! On this day, we commemorate the gift of the Holy Spirit to the church and explore His significance for the life of the church. The questions below are designed to assist you in better understanding and applying the passage. Please take time to discuss these questions with your family or home fellowship group.

- Luke mentions three supernatural phenomena—the sound of rushing wind, divided tongues of fire, and speaking in other tongues (v.I-4). What is the significance of each of these signs?
- How does Acts 2:5-13 fulfill what Jesus spoke to the disciples in Luke 24:46-49?
- How should Acts 2:5-13 inform our understanding of speaking in tongues?
- How do we receive the Holy Spirit?
- How would you answer someone who says, "I am saved, but I have not yet received the Holy Spirit?"
- What is the significance of Peter's quoting of Joel 2:28-32 in the midst of his sermon at Pentecost?

Without the Holy Spirit, Christian discipleship would be inconceivable, even impossible. There can be no life without the life-giver, no understanding without the Spirit of truth, no fellowship without the unity of the Spirit, no Christ-likeness of character apart from his fruit, and no effective witness without his power. As a body without breath is a corpse, so the church without the Spirit is dead—John Stott
