
This is the pattern of his love in redeeming and saving his people.







LITURGICAL CALENDAR

God built within His people an innate desire to celebrate, to mark seasons and events, to set up "stones of remembrance" so that we do not forget His goodness and promises. One method that the Church has used over time is dividing each year according to the events in the life of Christ—a reminder of redemptive history. Although the Church Calendar is not prescribed by Scripture, it can be a useful framework or tool to help walk our hearts through the Gospel every year.

The major divisions of the liturgical year are:

- Advent—The four Sundays leading to Christmas; preparation for the coming of Christ and the need for a Savior
- Christmas and the Twelve Days—Celebration of the Incarnation and the Gift of Christ, our Redeemer
- Epiphany—January 6; Coming of the Magi for Christ is the Light of the World; Hope for the Gentiles; Kingship of Christ
- Lent—from Ash Wednesday to Easter; repentance and reflection; recognition that our sinfulness leads to the cross; intentional time to exercise the disciplines of grace
- Holy Week—Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday; Jesus as King, Priest, Prophet; The remembrance that the shedding of blood was necessary for the forgiveness of sins
- Easter—Resurrection of the Living Lord; the conquering of death and sin
- Ascension—Christ in Power at the right hand of the Father; Christ interceding as the Mediator
- Pentecost—Coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church; God sends out His people as the Church
- Ordinary Time—The weeks between Pentecost and Advent; Living in light of the Gospel as the Church

Four weeks ago we began a series entitled, "When God Moves" focusing on the cameo portrait of the church in Acts 2:42-47. Today, we are looking specifically at Acts 2:44 and what it means to experience true Christian fellowship. To help you apply the teaching of today's message, please prayerfully read and discuss the questions below with your family or Home Fellowship group.

- ➤ How is the surprising nature of the people's togetherness an evidence of the gospel's unifying power?
- ➤ What role does belief play in true Christian togetherness?
- According to the passage, what kind of life does true Christian togetherness produce? What does it mean to have a common life?
- What would it take for the kind of togetherness that produces common life to be manifested more in our community? What are some ways we can pursue this?
- What calling is God extending to you today in light of this teaching? Said another way, what role might God be calling you to take up for the building of this type of community?
- Practice: This week identify at least one way you will strive to nurture true Christian fellowship. Please share your plan with you spouse, friend, and/or Home Fellowship Group. Ask them to pray for you and then report to them on how it goes.
