LITURGICAL CALENDAR

God built within His people an innate desire to celebrate, to mark seasons and events, to set up "stones of remembrance" so that we do not forget His goodness and promises. One method that the Church has used over time is dividing each year according to the events in the life of Christ—a reminder of redemptive history. Although the Church Calendar is not prescribed by Scripture, it can be a useful framework or tool to help walk our hearts through the Gospel every year.

The major divisions of the liturgical year are:

- Advent—The four Sundays leading to Christmas; preparation for the coming of Christ and the need for a Savior
- Christmas & Twelve Days—Celebration of the Incarnation & the Gift of Christ, our Redeemer
- Epiphany—January 6; Coming of the Magi for Christ is the Light of the World; Hope for the Gentiles; Kingship of Christ
- Lent—from Ash Wednesday to Easter; repentance and reflection; recognition that our sinfulness leads to the cross; intentional time to exercise the disciplines of grace
- Holy Week—Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday; Jesus as King, Priest, Prophet; The remembrance that the shedding of blood was necessary for the forgiveness of sins
- Easter—Resurrection of the Living Lord; the conquering of death and sin
- Ascension—Christ in Power at the right hand of the Father; Christ interceding as the Mediator
- Pentecost—Coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church; God sends out His people as the Church
- Ordinary Time—The weeks between Pentecost and Advent; Living in light of the Gospel as the Church

Worship is a response to the love of God that brings us out of darkness into his light. The rhythm and flow of the service reflects this present reality as God calls his people and reveals himself, forgives their sins, teaches them from his Word, the Bible, feeds them, and then sends them out to live what they have learned.


This is the pattern of his love in redeeming and saving his people.

Pastor: Let the favor of the LORD our God be upon us, and establish the work of our hands upon us;




The People of God respond to His Word by confessing their sins, repenting of their sinful ways, and seeking God's favor through the reconciling work of Jesus, the Son of God.

Corporate Confession of Sin—based on Romans 6:10-23 & 7:4-6

Pastor: Lord, we come confessing. When we were slaves to sin, we were free to ignore righteousness.

We hope that this time is helpful to you as you consider your relationship with Jesus Christ and with His people, the church.


At Cornerstone, we come forward to receive communion. You may take the bread at the first table and then proceed to either side for the wine/grape juice.

Prayers for Those Not Taking the Lord's Supper

If you are not able to partake in the Lord's Supper today, please use this time to meditate on one of the following prayers.

Prayer for Those Searching for Truth. Lord Jesus, you claim to be the way, the truth, and the life. Grant that I might be undaunted by the cost of following you as I consider the reasons for doing so. If what you claim is true, please guide me, teach me, and open me to the reality of who you are. Give me an understanding of you that is coherent, convincing, and that leads to the life you promise. Amen.

Prayer of Belief. Lord Jesus Christ, I admit that I am weaker and more sinful than I ever dared admit, but through you I am more loved and accepted than I ever dared hope. I thank you for paying my debt on the cross, taking what I deserved in order to offer me complete forgiveness. 

Prayer Focus—Dave and Robin Dillard serve as the Executive Director and Office Administrator for Servant Group International (SGI), a non-profit ministry focused on sharing the hope and love of Christ in Muslim communities. SGI was established in 1992 in response to the large number of Iraqi Kurdish refugees relocating to Nashville following the first Gulf War. Since that time, SGI has expanded to include outreach projects in Iraq, Turkey and Greece. In Nashville, SGI manages a network of staff and volunteers serving in after-school programs, summer camps and English language classes. In Iraq, SGI helped launch and currently provides teachers for a network of Christian schools enrolling 2,500+ Muslim students. Recently, SGI has been organizing and supporting a number of projects focused on helping refugee families return to their homes and rebuild their lives after ISIS. SGI also organizes short-term teams and projects to help serve among the large number of refugees arriving in Greece.

- Pray for safety for the Iraq team and open hearts among those they love and serve.
- Pray for additional overseas staff, as well as additional local volunteers.
- Pray for the Cornerstone church team that will be serving among refugees in Greece Summer 2018.
- Pray for open hearts among the refugees returning to their homes in Iraq.

EPIPHANY DEVOTIONALS: Scripture Reading Guide for the New Year



"All Scripture is breathed out by God and is profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work"

—2 Timothy 3:16-17

The Word of God is the foundation and lifeblood for every Christian disciple. That is why Cornerstone is committed to reading, preaching, praying, and singing the Bible each week in worship and laboring to instill through all our discipleship initiatives a love for and commitment to the Bible's teaching. Very simply, we believe that the more we're exposed to the means of grace of God's Word, the more opportunity we have for our lives to be transformed by it.

As we look to 2018, we're trying something new. Instead of just reading straight through the Bible, we're going to

read smaller selections that are scattered through the Scripture, so that you're getting a steady diet of Old and New Testament throughout the year. Further, the chosen Scriptures will center on themes from our sermon series, which means the main themes of our worship services will inform our Bible reading selections throughout the week.

We see benefits in approaching it this way. First, the smaller sections of Scripture give you time to reflect on the Word more deeply. Second, if you miss a day or two, you don't have to sweat it or feel like you're behind. You can just pick up wherever you are. Third, the repetitive emphasis of Scriptural themes from Sunday through your weekly Bible reading helps set a context for your Bible reading and will likely make a deeper spiritual impact on our heart.

We are also adding in a weekly memorization verse, or we might say, "meditation verse." It's important to be reading the Bible daily, but it's equally important to chew on particular texts in a meditative way, learning to hide words and phrases into your heart (Psalm II9:II).

We're hopeful that by approaching our Bible reading more intentionally, letting the Lord's Day worship service set our direction, we might experience in even greater measure of the living and active power of God's Word in our life together (Hebrews 4:12)

Today's message, "New Year's Resolution: Find Wisdom!" is taken from Proverbs 3:13-18. Please take time to discuss the following questions with your family, friends, or Home Fellowship Group.

- In your own words, how would you define biblical wisdom? How is wisdom different from being smart or having knowledge?
- Solomon says that wisdom's profit is better than riches and more precious than jewels (v.14-15). But how does one measure the value of wisdom?
- Think of the wisest person you know. What character qualities, habits, and practices do you observe in them? Is there a sense in which you can say that wisdom has been "a tree of life" to them (v.18)?
- Looking back over the past year, where do you see a lack of wisdom in your life? What would seeking-and-finding wisdom in 2018 look like for you? Take time over the next few days to consider some actionable steps to move toward wisdom this year.
