SERVICE OF CELEBRATION AND COVENANT RENEWAL

Iast Sunday of Epiphany 10 February 2013 This morning is the final Sunday in Epiphany with next Sunday being the First Sunday in Lent—the season of reflection, repentance, reconciliation and deeds of mercy before Easter Sunday. This is also our return to the study from the Book of Luke; providentially Luke 9 begins with Jesus sending out the disciples which is the call to be missional and where we left off from the Vision sermons in January—*To Be the People of God.*

We begin with the Call to Worship from Isaiah 12 with the call to make known the deeds of the Lord among the peoples that He may be known in all the earth. We sing Crown Him With Many Crowns acknowledging that the earth and all that is in it belong to Him alone. Our Psalm for February—Psalm 117: From All That Dwell continues the theme of singing the praise of our Redeemer through every land and by every tongue.

The Old Testament Reading from Isaiah 55 reminds us that the Word of God is like seed for us to sow and bread for those that receive it, and joy and peace will result wherever the Word is spread. However, in Ephesians 4, our Prayer of Confession, we remember that too often we seek to build up our own kingdoms instead of living in submission to Christ's kingdom seeking reconciliation in one hope. We continue by singing Let Children Hear the Mighty Deeds from Psalm 78 in which we acknowledge our call to "make His glories known, His works of power and grace" that generations yet unknown may hope in God alone and practice His commands.

Our final hymn, **Be Thou O God Exalted High** from Psalm 57, calls us to share the praise of the Lord "to all the listening nations round" that His glory would fill the skies as we bring thankful tribute unto Him. It is out of gratitude for who God is and what He has done that we respond in worship and then share His praise with others.

but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it.


- 12 "For you shall go out in joy and be led forth in peace;



The Reading of the Word—Luke 9:I-9, 10:I-16

I And he called the twelve together and gave them power and authority over all demons and to cure diseases, 2 and he sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal. 3 And he said to them, "Take nothing for your journey, no staff, nor bag, nor bread, nor money; and do not have two tunics. 4 And whatever house you enter, stay there, and from there depart. 5 And wherever they do not receive you, when you leave that town shake off the dust from your feet as a testimony against them." 6 And they departed and went through the villages, preaching the gospel and healing everywhere.

7 Now Herod the tetrarch heard about all that was happening, and he was perplexed, because it was said by some that John had been raised from the dead, 8 by some that Elijah had appeared, and by others that one of the prophets of old had risen. 9 Herod said, "John I beheaded, but who is this about whom I hear such things?" And he sought to see him.

I After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them on ahead of him, two by two, into every town and place where he himself was about to go. 2 And he said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. Therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. 3 Go your way; behold, I am sending you out as lambs in the midst of wolves. 4 Carry no moneybag, no knapsack, no sandals, and greet no one on the road. 5 Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace be to this house!' 6 And if a son of peace is there, your peace will rest upon him. But if not, it will return to you. 7 And remain in the same house, eating and drinking what they provide, for the laborer deserves his wages. Do not go from house to house. 8 Whenever you enter a town and they receive you, eat what is set before you. 9 Heal the sick in it and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' 10 But whenever you enter a town and they do not receive you, go into its streets and say, 11 'Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet we wipe off against you. Nevertheless know this, that the kingdom of God has come near.' 12 I tell you, it will be more bearable on that day for Sodom than for that town.

13 "Woe to you, Chorazin! Woe to you, Bethsaida! For if the mighty works done in you had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago, sitting in sackcloth and ashes. 14 But it will be more bearable in the judgment for Tyre and Sidon than for you. 15 And you, Capernaum, will you be exalted to heaven? You shall be brought down to Hades.

16 "The one who hears you hears me, and the one who rejects you rejects me, and the one who rejects me rejects him who sent me."

Elder: This is the Word of the Lord.



The resurrection of the body; and the life everlasting. Amen.



Our Father, who art in heaven, Hallowed be thy Name.


Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, On earth as it is in heaven.


